Fellow Rotarians,

We have a couple of exciting weeks coming up. Tomorrow we have Mala Malhotra and Sangeeta Malik of Nai Disha presenting to us. These two remarkable women started with a school that supports migrant laborers' children. These day laborers earn \$ 3-4 a day for manual labor and are usually not able to get their children a formal education. Nai Disha is a school that caters exclusively to this demographic. They are familiar with Rotary having worked on a women's sewing project with South Delhi Rotary. I have interacted with them, and they are a transparent organization doing very good work in the community. We are looking at partnering with them to bring skills that will give their children hope of raising themselves out of poverty.

Next week Dilworth Rotary is very pleased to present one of the leading intellectuals of our time, Mr. Ramachandra Guha, as a speaker for our Rotary family on 16 April. Mr. Guha's address will educate us about a prominent 20th century architect of peaceful change, Mahatma Gandhi.

Peace and Conflict Resolution has been an area of focus for Rotary International since 1914. Mr. Guha's address will also coincide with the new initiative Youth and Peace in Action, just launched by Peter Kyle, International Director for Zone 33 and 34.

Dilworth Rotary invites our Zone 33 and 34 family to join us at our regular scheduled Friday meeting to hear Mr. Guha's address. (please see page 3 for more information).

Rotary Supports Child and Maternal Health

Service & Engagement Staff, Rotary International, April 1, 2021

Maternal and child care is one of Rotary's main causes. Rotary makes health care available to vunerable mothers and children so they can live longer and grow stronger.

It is estimated that close to six million children under the age of five die each year because of malnutrition, inadequate health care, and poor sanitation, which can all be prevented. Rotary clubs and districts dedicate their efforts to improve access to quality care so that mothers and children can have long-serving opportunities for a healthy future. Projects to support mothers and children include mobile prenatal clinics, cancer screenings, immunizations, and training on how to protect themselves and their children from disease.



Here are a couple of projects that highlight innovative solutions that provide health care to mothers and children:

- ⇒ Nigeria averages only one physician for every 2,500 people and creative solutions are needed to expand health care reach. Read about how innovative integration of telehealth medicine have helped those living in rural Nigeria.
- ⇒ Brazil has experienced high infant mortality rates and several Rotary clubs partnered together to provide solutions. Read about how a Rotary club partnership led to an increase in resources for the incubators and access to Neonatal intensive care units at the Dr. Leopoldo Bevilacqua Regional Hospital in Brazil's Ribeira Valley.



Special Speaker Next Week—April 16, 2021

Mahatma Gandi by Ramachandra Guha



Charlotte Dilworth South End Rotary Club is very pleased to present one of the leading intellectuals of our time to a discussion with the Rotary family and friends. In the spirit of the International Director for Zone 33 and 34 Peter Kyle's initiative to provide peace-building initiatives and experience for young people.

Dilworth Rotary will be bringing to the Zone 33 and 34 families at our regular scheduled Friday Meeting one of the most influential thinkers of our time: Mr. Ramachandra Guha. US magazine Foreign Policy named him as one of the top 100 public intellectuals in the world in May 2008. In the poll that followed, Guha was placed 44th.

Mr. Guha will talk to us about the original architect of peaceful change. Mr. Mohandas Karamchand Gandhi (or Mahatma Gandhi). Mr. Guha has spent his career writing about, thinking about, advocating for, and understanding the path to peace through appreciation of the "giant of peace" Mahatma Gandhi. Gandhi was nominated for the Nobel Peace prize five times and provided the inspiration for a number of people to throw off the shackles of colonialism in their countries. Mr. Guha has faced persecution and jailing for standing up for free speech.

Below is a few of his numerous awards and honors:

- His essay, "Prehistory of Community Forestry in India", was awarded the Leopold-Hidy Prize of the American Society for Environmental History for 2001.
- A Corner of a Foreign Field was awarded the Daily Telegraph Cricket Society Book of the Year prize for 2002.
- He won the R. K. Narayan Prize at the Chennai Book Fair in 2003.
- Awarded the Padma Bhushan in 2009, India's third-highest civilian award.
- Received the Sahitya Akademi Award in 2011 for India after Gandhi.
- In 2014, Guha was awarded an honorary Doctor of Humanities by Yale University
- Awarded the Fukuoka Asian Culture Prize, 2015
- The American Historical Association (AHA) has conferred its Honorary Foreign Member prize for the year 2019 to Ramchandra Guha


