History of the Rotary Bell

In 1922, U.S. Rotarians organized an attendance contest; the challenge was that the losing clubs would join in giving the winning club a prize.

The Rotary Club of New York City was declared the winner and they were awarded as a prize a bell from a popular patrol boat, which was placed on wood that came from HMS "Victory", Admiral Nelson's vessel at the battle of Trafalgar.



Since then, the bell used in Rotary meetings started to represent, as on the ships, order, discipline, and the time to guide us through the weekly hour-and-a-half meetings. The bell informs us with its sound at the beginning of the Rotary meeting, other club rituals, and of course the closure of the regular club meeting.

This Week's Speaker

Lorena Prince



Montessori Education My husband Thom and I have lived in the Charlotte area since 2011. I am originally from south Texas and spent 15 years in Miami, FL. While studying Broadcast Journalism, I interned at Telemundo where I was invited to sit in on a corporate strategy meeting and then hired as a buyer for Telenovela scripts. The drama was heavy at the network in the 90s so the job was short-lived.

With a new passion and new goals in mind, I landed at American Arbitration Association where for 10 years as Regional Liaison I was in charge of business development, B2B sales, Arbitrator/Mediator Training, and union and condo association elections for south Florida and the Caribbean. It was during this time that I was introduced to Rotary and helped charter The Rotaract Club of Coral Gables, a community Club, and then the Rotaract Club of Miami which had 72 members in its first year.

Upon arriving in North Carolina, I continued my work in business development in the private sector working for several law firms including helping my husband start his own firm. I took a two-year sabbatical and focused on service to the community through various nonprofit organizations and serving on my Rotary Club's board and various D7680 committees and Rotary Zone 33 as Rotaract Advisor. I am currently RLI Chair.

Four years ago, I decided to use my Montessori Teacher Training certificate that I took in 1995 and was hired as a co-teacher of Spanish immersion primary at Phoenix Montessori Academy, but again found my way to the business office and am now their Director of Admissions and Student Services. I have been a longtime advocate for children in underprivileged and underserved communities and my goal has been to try to bring a Montessori education to children with lesser means by way of grants and scholarships.

Last Week's Meeting



Ken Otterbourg gave us a thorough look at the National Registry of Exonerations which was very eyeopening for many of our members. The number of innocent individuals who have been locked up for various amounts of time is overwhelming. Ken works with others to research and record this information in the registry. He answered questions and left with one intriguing question from Tom Philson.

Unfortunately, the video did not come out, so we can't share.

As a follow-up to Tom Philson's question, Ken emailed later with this information:

"One of the questions was about a man named Clarence Henderson. It's an interesting situation. He was convicted three times for murder, and each time the conviction was tossed. This is back in the 40s and 50s. Eventually, the state declined to pursue a fourth trial. They placed Henderson on what is called a "dead docket," which is a little bit of legal purgatory. They didn't pursue a trial, nor did they formally dismiss --- until last year.

"There are several things from the Registry's standpoint. First, does the dead docket count as a dismissal? I need to discuss this with my colleagues. I've never run across the issue. If we count the dead docket as a dismissal, then Henderson might qualify for our pre-1989 Registry IF at least one of his convictions was vacated based on new evidence of innocence. I'll let you know what I found out.

"I've done some research on Mr. Henderson's case. It doesn't meet our criteria for an exoneration, unfortunately. That's not to minimize the extent of the injustice etc. It's a tragic case. As I mentioned in my talk, exonerees need to have all their charges dismissed. Mr. Henderson's case was placed on a "dead docket," but it wasn't dismissed until after his death. Dismissals that occur post-mortem, such as what happened in Mr. Henderson's case, are viewed more properly through a political rather than legal lens. We've had other cases that we've not included based on this decision."






